#### **ENCROACHMENTS**

Owning property in Hawaiian Paradise Park has benefits and responsibilities. Sometimes the responsibilities escape our notice. The primary purpose of HPPOA is road maintenance and improvement which is accomplished through the mandatory road maintenance fees. There are no CC&Rs in HPP, but there are a number of policies which owners need to be aware of. One of these is road easement responsibilities.

Main roads are 60 feet wide; side roads 40 feet wide. The road itself is approximately 20 feet wide. The remaining footage is the easement on either side which must remain clear up to the perimeter of your property line. If your property pins are not clearly marked, approximately 10 feet from the edge of the road is the easement area. **There are to be NO structures (fences, gates, walls, statuary, etc) or plantings outside your property boundaries.** Some of these items may have been on the property when you purchased it, but they could be a safety hazard. Grass is acceptable and if you trim and mow the easement area, our sincere thanks.

The HPP Road Traffic and Safety Committee is diligently working on those areas of safety concern and will make recommendations to the board. Your cooperation in correcting problem areas is greatly appreciated. Thank you for caring for and about your community.

# NEEDED: Director Candidates! Six Districts open for Director Elections

Three 3-year terms of the nine-member Board of Directors will expire at the end of June and directors will be elected for Districts 5, 7, and 8. # **SPEED ORDINANCES**

Because of the dust issue and as an effort to try to control it, the HPP Board pursued initiating county approved speed ordinances for our roads so that excessive speed can be controlled.

Ordinance 1381 establishes a 15 mph limit on all unpaved HPP roads. Ordinance 1382 sets the speed limit on paved cross streets at 25 mph and Ordinance 1390 states that 35 mph is the speed limit on Shower, Paradise, Kaloli, and Maku'u Drives.

On dry days, it is sad to see owners pull out of their driveways and speed down their road creating clouds of dust. Everyone must adhere to an appropriate speed, but it is essential to be more diligent during the dusty times.

The law <u>does</u> allow police to issue tickets regarding speeding in subdivisions like HPP, so please be aware and drive accordingly.

Be a good neighbor and slow down.

## **Community Action Committee**

This is a new committee formed to explore the revision of the HPP Master Plan. The 1997 Master Plan approved by the County Council was revised in 2005 but that revision was never approved. The committee hopes to investigate the possibility of establishing a town center area and to construct some ball fields.

#### EDITORIAL BY ONE OF THE STAFF RE: ROAD FEES

We often get asked "So, what do we get for these outrageous road fees?" Here's your answer.

For your 76 cents per day, per lot, you don't have to go out and buy material to spread on the roads or to fill potholes. You don't have to hire someone with equipment to drop material, grade, and roll or to fill those potholes. Even if you only live one or two lots in from a paved road and could get the folks across the street to pitch in with the cost, it will cost each of you more than the \$275 you pay the Association each year and that won't leave you any money left over to remove any trees that may fall across the road in a storm, mow or otherwise control the vegetation common to this jungle environment. Don't forget you need to be able to drive to the highway and back to your lot, so all those miles of paved roadway also need to be maintained, not just the 135 feet in front of your lot. Asphalted roads also get potholes and cracks that need material and manpower to repair.

For your 76 cent a day, per lot, you don't have to bother removing the maggoty pig and other animal carcasses that are left by hunters or hit by speeding drivers on a regular basis. You don't have to have someone come and pick up the car parts, furniture, appliances and other household trash left by the side of the road. For your 76 cents a day you don't have to replace or repair the road signs which, by law, must be posted.

For your 76 cent per day, you employ a small staff and crew to do this, and more, for you. Some of your 76 cents goes to collect delinquent road maintenance fees. If <u>everyone</u> contributed to the maintenance of the subdivision as required by the Hawaii State Supreme Court decision, more improvements (including paving) could be done. While this Association was created specifically for road maintenance, we try to be helpful in other areas, totally unrelated to road maintenance. Some folks will say "Well, I can do all that myself". Maybe so, but why would you want to when you can get someone else to do it for you for less than the price of a cup of coffee?

\*33<sup>rd</sup> Ave will be paved as far as the remaining bond funds allow. This phase will use the remaining funds in the Road Paving Bond. Future paving will be done on an "as needed" basis using the Road Improvement Fund..
