ROAD MAINTENANCE UPDATE!

HPP is the second largest subdivision in the US, which explains the cost associated with many miles of roadways and common areas in need of maintenance and improvements.

Due to the silica content in red cinder the department of health has deemed this not a valid option on our private roadways. The aggregate used today on our roadways is 1½" base course purchased through 3 separate quarries. A rough idea of import and grading of 2 inches of material over 1 mile of roadway would be an approximate of 980 tons calculating the cost would be \$26,000. With the approximate of 65 miles of unimproved roads in HPP to repair and grade annually this can be quite costly! Asphalt paving cost varies as road conditions vary and is estimated to be between \$300,000 -\$450,000 per mile depending on road conditions and contractors estimates. To date the association has paved approximately of ½ of the subdivision.

The Corporation has made some significant improvements in the past couple of years to include:

Paving of 1st street between Kaloli and Paradise, and the restriping of the four thruway streets. 7th street off Kaloli dead end, 22nd street off Maku'u dead end, and 12th street between Paradise and Maku'u will be paved shortly, the board of directors are moving forward on approval of another 2 miles to be paved. The installation of road reflectors is underway for the 4 main access roads to enable safer driving conditions especially during nighttime hours and severe weather conditions. The association has recently erected a 6' security fence around the maintenance warehouse for the safety of the public and employees which will ensure safeguarding of the corporation's assets. Please be patient and understanding in the efforts and costs associated with the maintenance of our community roadways and community properties. Working together

Through the Past

Have you ever wondered what took place on this land we live on in days of past? I looked into it and found these acres of Hawaiian Paradise Park have an interesting history which I would like to share as I discover.

HPP was the ahupua'a of Waiakahelē in those times. Most of the villages were along our shoreline, rather than inland. We all know that Kamehameha the Great was the first king of Hawai'i. We know he lived from 1736-1819. We also know he was from the Big Island. I had always associated him with Kona but before he became king, he had to conquer his enemies on both the Big Island and the other islands and stayed extensively in Hilo and fought in Puna and Kau.

Several battles were fought in Puna by Kamehameha and his supporters beginning in the 1750's. Kamehameha was fighting rivals for leadership of the island of Hawai'i. I enjoyed several accounts found in Hawaiian Warfare by Tom Walforth and will supply the link at the end of this article. Here is one account: leaving Hilo, Kamehameha's forces travelled to nearby Laupahoehoe by canoe, and used this frontier zone as a staging area for raids on Hilo. During his encampment at Laupahoehoe, Kamehameha set out on a task that became famous in Hawaiian lore. He decided that he needed to secure a sacrifice for war preparation ceremonies, so he organized the crew of his personal war canoe to sail east past Hilo to the Puna coast without notifying anyone else. He landed at Papai'i in Kea'au where he saw fishermen with their families along the shoreline, folks living under the rule of his enemy Keawema'uhihi. Kamehameha ran towards the assembled group. Most of them fled, but two men were trapped and stood to fight the oncoming warrior. The fishing folk had but their paddles for weapons, and they used them as best they could against this unknown assailant. That turned out to be sufficient, because Kamehameha inadvertently stepped into a crevice in the lava, got stuck and could not leave the spot. The fighting fishermen took advantage of the situation to rain blows with their paddles down on the chief's head. With the help of his canoe crew Kamehameha was able to extricate himself and escape to Laupahoehoe.

Just think fishermen on our land fought hand to hand with Kamehameha !! Their village and port were Papai'i at Shipman's, just next door to HPP on the Hilo side. It is near the Shipman estate. (a family I am exploring and hope to write about) The battles raged on in Puna and Kau, and our Waiakahelē, with many battles and skirmishes. Ke'eaumoku with the foreigners John Young and Isaac Davis with their arms and cannon, attacked Kea'au forces somewhere in Hilo. At the same time Kamehameha's army under the direction of Ka'iana took a fleet of war canoes to South Point. Keoua's warriors set out in canoes and attacked Ka'iana's men just off the coast there. The battle moved to land at Paiaha'a below Kama'oa (Volcano). The fierce battle lasted for three days. The two forces continued fighting at Kama'oa and Ua'ohulelua where the struggle was worst of all. Keoua Kamehameha's rival maneuvered north to Punakoki in Puna then made a stand before Ka'iana's pursuing army. Keoua escaped to the Kilauea volcano, which erupted. Many warriors died from the poisonous gas emitted from the volcano. They fought for three more days until Ka'iana fled, boarding his canoes, and leaving the east side of the island. At that point Kamehameha became King of Hawai'i.

Just think our little community was once the site of fierce battles by feathered warriors vying for control of the island!
