

Meeting Began Call to order 9:am. Minutes from last month were passed out to anyone who didn't see them on line. They were voted on and approved as per info. supplied at the time of the meeting. If new or corrected info come in later, we will change the archival copies.



(Additional info has come in since the meeting and there were 3 additions to our crime stats and map: an assault on 6th Ave. A Theift on 27th, and a vehicle break-in on Beach Rd. off Kaloli. We do not have the dates or other info on these crimes.)

July's 2019's Crime Stats Read by Judi Houle

The Officer was not available, for our meeting so Judi Houle read and commented on the crimes from last month.

As always, we want everyone to sign up for **NIXLE ALERTS**. Go to Nixle.com and sign up for road closures, emergencies, current crimes, who the police are looking for and who they have arrested.

Judi passed out photos of active alerts the police are looking for and discussed several hot items.

Reminder, Lock your house when you go for a walk. Recent incidents have been a scarey reminder to always do this.

Judi met with our District 4 County Council Member Ashley Kierkiewicz, Hawaii County Prosecuting Attorney Mitch Roth and HPD's Captain Briski about the dangerous criminals squatting in vacant or abandoned homes in our community. Together they have formed a Task Force to mitigate the problem. The Task Force includes Police, Prosecuting Attorney, Property Tax office, Banks, Realtors, County Council, and Neighborhood Watch. They are all working together to find solutions to stop the illegal squatting in homes and notifying absent property owners. Requiring owner's current phone number and email information has been suggested. This should help in allowing us to act swiftly if a property becomes delinquent and prime for illegal possession .This should eliminate the lack of a accurate documentation that has prevented the prosecutors office and police from putting a stop to this problem.

Unpermitted junk yards are another big problem in HPP and is a source of crime and environmental disaster in the making. We spoke about how to deal with these. Forms were shared and instructions on how to proceed if you have this issue near you. *See the agenda for info*.

Squatters' & Drug Houses Warnings

We've resolved 16 homes with squatters and drug activity over the past 2 years by working closely with neighbors, NW, HPD, and Vice.

Chair, If you suspect squatters: log their license plates, note vehicle types and colors, catalogue people comings and goings. Report to HPD, VICE, and Neighborhood Watch. It helps to report to all three. If we are all on the same page the better the chance good results will happen. Our CPO has repeatedly confirmed the best protocol for reporting squatters is to give the physical location and activities.

SOME ADDITIONAL DISCUSSION on SQUATTERS Residents share their own stories of having to deal with squatters and how it has impacted their lives and their neighbors. We talk story & share ideas at meetings of how to handle this epidemic and success stories with the best ways to PREVENT a squatter house from popping up in your neighborhood. NW members share ideas on dealing with this problem and what our government officials are doing and not doing to help us. The important thing is that we act together and prevent empty building from falling into a problem properties. There are always ideas shared at our meetings and solutions presented. The bottom line is it is much easier to prepare ahead of the problem by knowing all you can about the people and properties that surround you. Keep contact info on hand to alert the police and property owners of any changes ASAP. Talk to your neighbors because you/we are all in this together.

Security Surveillance Updates & Messages We have loaner cameras again.



You can let us know the details of your issues and the board will follow and get in touch with you. Or come to the meeting and speak to the President in person.

Camera Report by Mary Cornish

I've contacted 8 people who have had the cameras for an extended period of time. I have obtained 2 cameras and 2 were returned at the meeting. I attempted to retrieve 2 cameras from individuals who had no instructions or keys left with the cameras. I was not able to retrieve those cameras without the cable lock keys. One individual needed to contact a family member to help him identify where the camera may have been placed. I will continue to make attempts to obtain all outstanding units.

Our cameras are available at our meetings and we have more on order if someone is in need, please sign up. We have changed the loan time to 90 days now. If it is not needed by another resident on the wait list we do allow a borrower to keep the cameras longer. Please know that the longest out after 90 days will be first called back in.

We still have an **engraving tool** that we freely loan out to HPP residents. Residents can mark their valuables for proof of ownership. We suggest using your name, address, or phone number to help identify your items if or when recovered. Often stolen items will turn up during a police raid, at garage sales, on Craig's List, and/ or at Swap Meets. If it is marked with "Property of" and your name, it becomes very hard to past it off at any random 2nd hand sale. Pawn shops will not want it and it makes it harder to sell. Honest people don't want to buy stolen items. Criminals just want to turn your hard earned goods into quick cash for any number of reasons including drug use.

REMINDER: Reminder for the group that crimes are often just executed because the opportunity is there. So please don't give thieves the chance. Secure your belongings. Cable lock your equipment up. This may slow thieves down. Get a security system with cameras, organize with your neighbors. Also reminded residents about common practices to help make your property and yourself safer by referring to the Helpful Hints hand out supplied by NW. Also signing up for NIXLE.COM alerts. He also shared his info about "Squatter Properties" and problem areas his sharing info and cameras with. These properties are a chronic source of crime and unrest to all the neighbors in the immediate area. In addition the crimes radiate outward from these locations effecting everyone in HPP.

So please keep reporting empty properties to us and the police when activities are seen.

Neighborhood Watch is not just about crime, but finding ways to prevent crime and target projects to strengthen our community with special outreach events.

NOTE: Neighborhood Watch has been working closely with our State and County Representatives, Prosecuting Attorney, Police, and Vice to represent and protect residents in HPP and Puna from criminal activity. When new Bills come up needing Testimony and Support, please take the time to write or go in person. HB 1561 (Nuisance Abatement) became law, but more are needed to secure our neighborhoods.

Rep. Joy San Buenaventura has introduced 4 bills to address squatters: fine absent homeowners / banks, allow Dept. of Taxation to demolish or sell vacant and abandoned homes, and allow neighbors and HOA to evict squatters.



Aug's Blockwatch Captain's Report

Gary was unavailable for the meeting but wanted to share his regular message of: Organize with your neighbors, they are your best defense. They are your eyes and ears when you are not home.

Please Keep calling that Non-Emergency 935-3311 for anything that doesn't look or feel right.

Your safety is most important. If you want to take photos, be discreet and act like you are talking on your phone.

REMEMBER: WE DON'T WANT YOU TO AGITATE SUSPECTED CRIMINALS & PUT YOURSELF AT RISK.



ERT EMERGENCY RADIO TEAM REPORT

by Gregg Datlof, Team Capt. "Good news, we are pretty well all built out". Gregg was referring to our emergency radio system. We can set up a portable repeater in just minutes and be ready to broadcast and receive calls from team members out in the field (throughout the subdivision) assessing damage from any number of different disasters. We can

reach out to HAM operators that will give us a larger range to broadcast or receive about conditions throughout the island. We are ahead of the Civil Defense in our radio readiness in that they can not receive info from us or share to us. Gregg has a meeting with a local volunteer fireman who is excited to learn about our capabilities and how we may help residents and share info with the fire company in the park.

Gregg wanted to set up two meetings to finish the programing of everyone's radio and address the search and rescue plan. He would like to do this 8/6 and 8/13. He will email everyone if those dates work.

Message from Our V.P. Chris Gray

Chris answered a question on radio protocol. The question was. *What to do if an emergency call comes in while doing a Net Control practice?* "You pause the Net Control and deal with the current emergency which has precedent over any practice drill. The call may be coming from some one who has no access to 911. You must help in a way that will forward the proper info to those that can best remedy the callers emergency.

Many of our own NW Emergency Radio team are also very dedicated HAM operator volunteers. (Amateur Volunteer Radio Operators, nick named radio Hams). Just 2 years ago it was Ham operators that provided all the info to coordinate emergency help during Puerto Rico's Hurricane Maria disaster. They did so with volunteers using walkie-talkies to Ham Volunteers. When all Puerto Rico's power and other communications were down it was these radio volunteers that leapt into action to support rescue and recovery. According to CNN.

Chris explained that our team has an isolated system. No one on the outside can call us or us them. But, now with our new repeater we have a frequency pair to connect to Ham. This allows us reach out up to 25 miles. By reprogramming old equipment we will have a Ham system at our disposal in an actual emergency.

Mauna Kea has a repeater controlled by the county through Civil Defense. It can be activated during an emergency such as the last big earthquake and lava flow. It can reach Maui. They test it once a month and Ham enthusiast can tune in and listen.

"For information about our radio team feel free to contact Greg at: 443-3713 - wh77fc@gmail.com NOTE: We often explain why we started the radio team and what our purpose is to some new residents. Sudden and Island-wide disaster such as an earthquake could cause island beltways to become impassable. Imagine how many areas of your life could be affected. In addition, all the obvious problems and now add no communication with the outside world. Hurricane Season is June-November. Hurricane activity and intensity increases during August and September. Earthquakes & volcanic activity doesn't have a season, they can occur anytime without notice.

Community Emergency Response Teams C.E.R.T. Program by Pat Steffen, HPP CERT Lead

CERT members are trained to respond to disasters when professional first responders are overwhelmed or delayed in responding. CERT training is beneficial even if it is just something you want to learn for yourself and immediate family, but when you join the HPP CERT team, you play a valuable role in helping your community get through the aftermath of a disaster and back on its feet. For those who don't know, our team was front and center the full length of the lava emergency in lower Puna. With our CERT training and the wonderful dedication of our HPP CERT members, we were able to make a real difference for Puna residents impacted by the disaster.

Every month HPP CERT has a fundraising table at the Swap Meet for public outreach and to help raise funds for emergency equipment and supplies. HPP residents are welcome to stop by and chat with us about the CERT program and general disaster preparedness.

"Hurricane season runs from June 1 to November 1. Experts from the National Weather Service have predicted an active hurricane season for the central Pacific. So far we managed to dodge Erick and Flossie and at the time of this writing there is no storm activity that could impact us. However, we are only at the beginning of September so residents are advised to remain hurricane-ready.

Hawaii is the most isolated populated island chain in the world. Hawaii County is #1 out of the 3,140 counties in the USA for the potential to be impacted by hazards. You need to be prepared. When disaster strikes our area, you will know what to do if you've had CERT training. HPP CERT meets the 3rd Thursday every month at 6 p.m. in the HPP Activity Center Library. The next Basic CERT Training Class will be in Keaau starting Sat, Sept. 28. To register for the class or to get more information, please contact the Hawaii County CERT Coordinator at hawaiicert@gmail.com."

www.hawaiicounty.gov/active-alerts Emergency Alert System Radio Stations: KHLO 850 AM, KKBG 97.9 FM, KPUA 670 AM, KWXX 94.7 FM **Emergency Preparedness Tips Develop a Family Emergency Plan that includes every** member of the family (and pets) and make sure each member of the family understands the plan. Exercise your plan - conduct an evacuation drill, check your first aid kit, rotate emergency food and water supplies. Figure on 1 gallon of water per person per day (2 qts. for drinking, 2 qts for cooking and sanitation). Do not wait until the last minute to buy supplies everybody will need such as batteries and water (stores may run out). Know where your family will meet if a disaster occurs. Have a "go" bag ready for each member of the family and pets that can sustain you for 3 days should you need to evacuate. Keep a list of items to add at the last minute (e.g. medications, reading glasses, etc.). Keep important documents in one place so you can grab them quickly. Include proof of home ownership, rental agreement, insurance, bank info, vehicle titles, pet microchip info and current photos of all family members. Have a list of emergency numbers near or entered in your phone. Make sure you have some emergency cash on hand. If there is no power, ATMs and charge card machines may not work. If you are staying in place, have at least 14 days of food, water, and disaster supplies on hand. Know how to safely turn off your gas, electricity, and water. NOTE: Gas must be turned on by a qualified professional.

Reminder and Info for new residents EMERGENCY ACTION COMMITTEE

Hawaiian Paradise Park has an Emergency Response Plan that can be found on the HPPOA.net website. If a Disaster hits HPP our Activity Center will be turned into a Command Center to assist our residents to provide services and supplies. **Reminder:**

Our Team springs into action after a disaster. Several of our NW members are also volunteers on our EAC. It will allow us to act quickly to help those who may need it. If you wish to volunteer for this worthwhile program feel free to contact us through the NW email.

Identifiction card or drivers license, Credit/debit card numbers, bank account numbers, Medical insurance cards, Advance healthcare directives, Copy of titles/deeds to property, Copy of prescriptions (medicine, hearing aids, glasses, etc). You can scan all these documents into a computer and EMAIL the doc to you own email acct. You will be able to access all your documents when the internet is back up.

Change of clothes and sturdy shoes, Portable battery or crank powered. Non-perishable foods, Water, Storage containers, Hygiene supplies, Comfort items, & whistle. Don't forget all the things you need for your pets.



Are You Hurricane Ready?

TERMS TO KNOW

Tropical Disturbance

A moving area of thunderstorms in the tropics that maintains its identity for 24 hours or more.

Tropical Depression Rotary circulation, sustained wind speed 38 miles per hour (33 knots) or less.

Tropical Storm

Distinct rotary circulation, sustained wind speed range of 39-73 miles per hour (34-63 knots).

Hurricane

Pronounced rotary circulation, sustained wind speed of 74 miles per hour (64 knots) or more.

Small Craft Advisory Statement

When a tropical cyclone threatens a coastal area, small craft operators are advised to remain in port or not to venture into the open sea.

Gale Warning Issued when winds of 39-54 miles per hour (34-47 knots) are expected.

Storm Warning Issued when winds of 55-73 miles per hour (48-63 knots) are expected.

Hurricane Watch Issued whenever there is a good possibility of hurricane conditions of damaging winds, surf and flooding rains

occurring anytime within 48 hours. This is the time to take action and commence some preparations for your family, business and property.

Hurricane Warning Issued when there is a high probability of hurricane force winds occurring anytime within 36 hours.

It is stressed that in the areas of the island covered by the warning, stay on the alert and complete all safety precautions once warnings are issued

Flash Flood Watch Means a flash flood is possible in the area; stay alert.

Flash Flood Warning Means a flash flood is imminent or occurring; take immediate action.

Tornadoes Spawned by hurricanes; sometimes produce severe damage and casualties.

OUTSIDE Your Home / Business

- Take down canvas awnings or roll them up and lash them with sturdy rope or twine.
- Board up windows using lumber securely fastened.
- Check door locks to assure that they will not blow open.
- Check outdoor items that might blow away or be torn loose. Secure these items as best as possible or take them indoors. Chairs, flower pots, tools, heavy fruits from trees (Coconuts)
- •Store chemicals, fertilizers, and other toxic chemicals in a safe section or secure area.

NOTE: You should complete your securement well before the hazards arrive.

Recommended Evacuation Kit (GO BAG)

- Bedding (Blankets, Sleeping Bags, etc.)
- Chanae of Clothina
- Special Medications & Dietary Foods
- Important Papers and Documents
- Infant Necessities (Formula , Food, Diapers, etc.
- Personal Toilet Articles & Sanitary Items
- Nonperishable Snacks for 1-2 days
- Portable Radio, Flashlights & batteries
- Water- 2 qts per person per day for drinking • PETS, Be sure to provide for your pets, they may
- not be allowed in the shelter. • If you evacuate, Leave a note for those absent.

Take actions to safeguard your crafts and complete your actions before damaging surf or winds and Booding rains arrive. All constal areas will be closed during the storm and roadways can be blocked by debris without warning.

You can assume that if a hurricane or tropical storm strikes your area, all utilities will be affected. Be ready to cope with less of water, electricity, gas, and telephone services.

Know your area. Prepare evacuation plans ahead of time, if your home, business, or other property may be endangered by high surf, flooding, or winds Be prepared to evacuate before the danger arrives.





- Residents along low lying constal areas. Use tsunami evacuation maps in your phone book as guidelines. Residents along ridge lines exposed to strong winds. Residents in low lying areas subject to flooding Residents of wooden frame or other lightly-constructed buildings

- (Evacuation center locations and opening times will be announced on local Hawai'j Island radio stations.)

Stay calm, stay alert, and stay informed. Listen to official announcements by Hawai'i Co and the National Weather Service.

INSIDE Your Home / Business

• Tape glass windows on the inside with large Xs to reduce shattering. Close curtains and blinds for added protection. If boards or tape isn't available, secure blankets to the inside to lessen the hazard of flying glass. • wedge sliding glass doors with a brace or broom handle to prevent them from being lifted out of the tracks or ripped loose by strong winds.

• Unplug all unnecessary appliances. Shut off gas valves. •Turn refrigerators and freezers to the coldest setting. Do not open unless necessary. If you have room, freeze water in plastic bottles or zip lock bags to help keep other food cold if power goes out.

• If you are going to evacuate your premises shut off, power, gas and water at the main source.

•Package your valuables such as jewelry, titles, deeds, insurance papers, stocks, bonds, licenses, inventory of home and property (photos) for safekeeping in a waterproof container. Take these with you if you evacuate.

We have added a few ideas from HPP NW

• Keep Cash ready & more than one credit card. Photo copies of important doc. in case you use a safety deposit box and may not be able to access it for several days.

• Paper list of all important contact info. Your phone may not be usable to contact family & insurance Co. • When hurricane warning is issued, keep all cars filled with

gas and don't park under an large trees or in low areas that are prone to flooding.

• Pets are family, keep their ID Chip documents, vet's info, extra leashes, long rope, food, pet carriers, & meds ready. • Keep a large tarp & rope ready, there are many uses.

- Put spare car & power charges in your Go bag.
- Put recent photos of loved ones and pets in your Go Bag in case you get separated.

• Matches or lighter, candles & some basic camping tools. (We need to remember Puerto Rico's hurricane disaster and our own lava disaster)
