"Archaeological Resources: Within the subdivision exist some archeological sites attributed to an ancient Hawaiian settlement. A report was produced by Archaeologist Paul H. Rosendahl in 1985. NaleimailekHawaii.gov. Due to the fact that laws pertaining to historical property have changed over the past ten years it is possible a new assessment may be necessary for HPP. (See Appendix D)..."
